BACKGROUND

Citizen competence is crucial for active political participation, one of the main components of good governance and sustainable democracy.

Especially in the Eastern part of the Danube Region, political participation is stagnating. Particularly worrisome are apathy and lack of political interest on the side of the younger population.

The core element of the citizen's competence is **high media literacy**. It is necessary for citizens reflection on social reality and their resilience to negative media phenomena, like hate speech and fake news.

ABOUT THE PROJECT

To address and strengthen media literacy and active citizenship in the Danube Region, a consortium of 16 partners from 10 Danube Region countries and their associated partners developed the MELIA Observatory project, financed by the Danube Region Programme -Interreg.

The MELIA Observatory project is vital as it addresses the challenges of the digital age, where access to information for people of all ages has increased, but critical thinking and media literacy skills have not kept pace.







THE IMPORTANCE

In many countries of the Danube region, the development of competencies of media literacy and active citizenship are far behind more developed parts of Europe. The project focuses on strengthening the competencies of youth and the people who work with them to address the gap in media literacy.


Strengthening media literacy is especially important in a world where fake news and misinformation are on the rise, leading to a decline in trust in public institutions. 5005G

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WORK OF MELIA OBSERVATORY PROJECT

One of the primary outputs of the project is the Handbook on media literacy, which offers a detailed account of the state of media education and media literacy in project partner countries (Bulgaria, Croatia, Czech Republic, Hungary, Germany, Montenegro, Romania, Serbia and Slovenia), from a plethora of perspectives, including legislative and institutional settings, to success stories and styles of media messaging.

Building on the observations from the Handbook, the project created the **Media** Literacy Observatory application that provides an instrument for scrutinizing media contents, training tools and policy recommendations for upgrading media literacy in relation to other civic skills. Observatory is designed as a userfriendly web application that serves as a tool for practical education in media literacy and enables the analysis of source texts.

WORK OF MELIA OBSERVATORY PROJECT

Based on the detection of good practices from inside and outside the Danube Region, MELIA Observatory partners also developed **innovative educational toolkits in the field of media literacy and active citizenship**: a toolkit for the training of pupils in higher years of elementary school (eighth, ninth year), a toolkit for the training of high school students (with focus on vocational schools), and a toolkit for the training of youth educators (teachers, tutors, coaches).

The toolkit equips educators with the necessary skills to teach pupils and students about media literacy, critical thinking skills, behaviour on social networks, manipulation and propaganda, marketing and advertising, media communication and politics.

The learning materials consist of handbooks and interactive materials and are **freely available in 5 languages**.

CONNECTION WITH EUSDR

In addition to these tools, the MELIA Observatory project has established a network of media literacy stakeholders from the region, enhancing collaboration among organizations promoting media literacy and active citizenship.

The project is an excellent example of how cross-border cooperation can address social challenges and has laid a strong foundation for media literacy and active citizenship in the Danube Region. The project's success could serve as a blueprint for other EU regions facing similar challenges in media literacy.

The project activities that ran from 2020 to 2022 are connected with **Priority Area 10** (Institutional Capacity and Cooperation), focusing on strengthening governance, institutional capacities (via capacity-building activities) and transnational cooperation in addressing societal challenges across the Danube.
