Is the water clean and passable enough for fish to survive?

Session host: EUSDR Priority Area 4 – Water Quality.

The session aims to emphasise the importance of connectivity restoration and water quality in the Danube River for habitat conservation, particularly focusing on migratory fish species, including sturgeons as the Danube flagship species. The session will start with a brief introductory video on the negative human impacts on the living conditions of migratory fish. The impulse lecture will set the scene, followed by an overview of the importance of fish conservation, the maintenance of water quality and connectivity restoration including projects' achievements in the Danube River. Navigating nature's extremes: Understanding the dynamics of floods and droughts

Session host: EUSDR Priority Area 5 – Environmental Risks

Floods, droughts and low flow events, as well as water scarcity conditions, are likely to become more intense, longer, and more frequent due to climate change as well as socio-economic pressure. In recent years, most notably in 2002, 2006, 2013 and in the summer of 2014, parts of the Danube River Basin District were affected by extreme flooding events. These events caused significant human and economic damages in the affected countries and communities. Especially managing drought needs to be reconceptualised in the light of climate change, taking into account that drought is a slow onset disaster. It takes months or years to become disastrous, but may cause more severe damage to humans and environment than many rapid onset disasters.

Field Trips

In the afternoon of 21st June, five site visits are offered, to allow participants to discover interesting sites in and around Vienna, closely connected to the Danube River and the Danube Region.

14:00 – 17:00

Site visit 1: Boat trip in Lobau National Park: LIFE WILDisland

The excursion will take place in the riparian landscape of the Donau-Auen National Park, starting at Stopfenreuth on the Danube. We will paddle down the Danube and its side branches in large inflatable boats (10 people per boat, guided by experience rangers, no prior experience required) and take a short walk. Several successful revitalization projects have restored the banks here to a natural state, reconnecting the side branches with the Danube. Within just a few years, the Danube has significantly reshaped these areas, and we will see extensive bank cracks, gravel banks and impressive river meanders. White-tailed eagles, Bee-eaters and Kingfishers have (re)conquered the habitat and, with a bit of luck, we may even spot some of these species.

We will discuss the various revitalization projects of the Donau-Auen National Park, the international cooperation for river restoration and preservation, as well as the first European river-based Danube WILDisland Ramsar Regional Initiative. It is placing outstanding value on the conservation and restoration of pristine islands along the entire length of the Danube and providing for joint coordinated measures to help improve the invaluable ecosystem services and biodiversity of the Danube.

Site visit 2: Tour of the Port of Vienna: thinkport VIENNA

thinkport VIENNA is an open mobility laboratory that confronts urban logistics challenges and develops comprehensive, long-term solutions. Located within the Port of Vienna, thinkport VIENNA promotes logistics solutions for a livable city and creates space for sustainable solutions. This tour explores the open innovation spaces and real test environments from thinkport VIENNA for urban logistics concepts at the Port of Vienna.

The Port of Vienna is a company of the City of Vienna, a subsidiary of Wien Holding. With the Freudenau Harbour, Albern Harbour, and the Lobau oil terminal, the Port of Vienna is the largest freight logistics hub in eastern Austria. Thanks to its connection to three TEN-T corridors, the Port of Vienna is a very attractive transport hub for international trade and transport routes.

The tour covers a visit to Freudenau Harbour and Albern Harbour. Freudenau Harbour is the centre of the cargo handling facilities on the Danube in Vienna. It contains handling amenities for bulk goods and raw materials, the container terminal, a car terminal, warehouses and depots, distribution centres for brand articles, the largest free port in Austria with a customs office, its own police station, and the offices of Hafen Wien. Albern Harbour handles building materials, agricultural and steel products. There are five large grain silos on the site with a capacity of 90,000 tons, making Albern the most important grain handling location in Eastern Austria. The tour also allows to visit the land reclamation and terminal expansion project.

Site visit 3: Tour of the Danube Island: LIFE DICCA Project (Vienna)

The LIFE DICCA project is aimed at combating the adverse effects of climate change on the valuable ecosystem of the Danube Island in Vienna. In the 1970s and 1980s, the Danube Island was designed as part of Vienna's flood protection system but quickly evolved into one of Vienna's favourite recreational spaces. Through this six-year EU-funded initiative, LIFE DICCA aims to develop climate change adaptation strategies for inner-city ecosystems around the example of the Danube Island. In this excursion, witness firsthand the implementation of targeted measures to safeguard this vital urban green space and recreational haven, while also preserving its biodiversity amidst the challenges posed by climate change.

Site visit 4: BOKU River Lab (Vienna)

The BOKU River Lab offers unparalleled research opportunities in the fields of flood protection, river morphology, sediment transport, hydropower, and waterway management. Led by experts in the field, participants will navigate through the facility's diverse research zones, including its flagship 90-meter main channel and specialised laboratories, gaining insights into the laboratory's pivotal role in advancing our understanding of river processes, sediment dynamics, and ecological preservation.

Join this excursion to discuss the laboratory's contributions to critical areas such as flood management, sustainable energy, and climate change adaptation. Through this immersive experience, explore the intricate interplay between research, innovation, and environmental stewardship in shaping our water-dependent world.

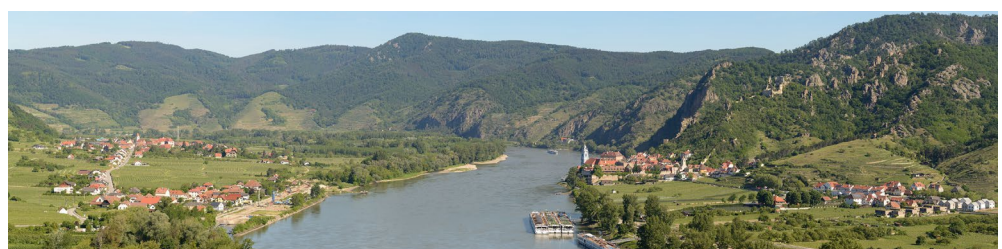
